Parish Youth Council Winshill leads the way

The politicians of the future were on display at the Neighbourhood Resource Centre in Canterbury Road last month when members of the School Councils of each of the schools in Winshill (Abbot Beyne, Holy Rosary, Tower View and Winshill Village) were guests of the Parish Council to thank them for their help in a consultation on how we can improve Winshill for young people.

Having consulted with, and received the blessing of, the headteachers of the schools the idea of a Parish Youth Council was put to the young people and was greeted with enthusiasm. Consequently, we hope to have elections at each of the schools and at Winshill Youth Club some time in the Autumn Term.

The Youth Council will have its own Parish Clerk and be responsible for its own budget. This will be the first Youth Council of its kind in East Staffordshire and we have been promised support from the Borough Council and from Trent and Dove Housing.

Winners in each category will receive a trophy and £50 in Garden vouchers and the winners will be invited to collect their prize and enjoy a meal at the *Burton in Bloom Presentation Evening* at Byrkley Garden Centre on Thursday 9th September, 2010.

Restoration of Hope, Burundi, in conjunction with Winhill FC



Almost a year ago, an unusual partnership started forming between Winhill FC and the Church in Burton, around an exciting venture supporting the Restoration of Hope charity in Burundi, Central Africa. Having raised money through charity football matches for several years, the Church in Burton were challenged to do more by Libby Ford, a local lady who moved out to Burundi ten years ago to run a number of orphanages in what was then a war zone. Phil Pusey, using his links with Winhill FC, helped to bring the partnership together through the idea of running a football academy. Gary Dunne, Secretary of Winhill FC said "I have wanted to do something like this since I was 16, and feel as if someone has opened a window of opportunity I thought had passed me by"

On April 2nd 2010, 6 Winhill FC coaches and 2 members of the Church in Burton flew out to visit Restoration of Hope, running a 5 day football academy for street kids. The week began with about 200 young people participating, but by the Friday this had risen to 350! Homelessness is one of the biggest challenges facing Burundi, and the charity is working directly to alleviate this issue by housing around 40 lads, providing them with school fees, clothing and regular meals, as well as pastoral support.

The highlight of the trip was a visit to Sabe village, home to around 1500 extremely poor people. Just 18 months ago the whole village was under 4 feet of water due to high rainfall. Restoration of Hope have provided free clean water for drinking, washing, cooking, etc., as well as food programmes particularly focusing on the children. The day we left they opened a school for 70 children which includes providing a porridge breakfast to enable the children to concentrate during the day.

The group raised and took £7000 over, and have since raised a further £3000 through sponsored events, charity football matches and involving schools and groups. Future events include a golf day and a sportsman's dinner which should raise more money. Many donations of food, clothing, football equipment, comics, washing items and medical aid were also taken over. A big thank you to all you supported this project in any way. There is talk of another visit next year sometime, so watch this space.
