
Parish Paragons in The National Forest

Make Poverty History

My family (husband Neville, children Rachel, 16, and Duncan, 13) and I went to Edinburgh for the MakePovertyHistory March. We travelled by train. It was amazing to see the massive 'human' white band around the centre of the city and to be part of the minute's silence there at 3pm. We wore white clothing and took with us strips of white material with messages written on them by members of the local Methodist Churches. The messages were added to a massive display which was taken to the G8 leaders .

I feel very conscious that 'MakePovertyHistory' or 'Drop the Debt' are not magic words - it's not like saying 'Abracadabra' and whoosh, everything's all right. Yes, we hope that the 8 hours of protest on the 2nd July will help to change the minds of 8 men and the lives of 800 million people. But, the real challenge is - are we willing to 'live more simply so that others may simply live'. Afterwards, the priority will be to ensure that appropriate aid goes to where it is most needed and not into the pockets of corrupt leaders. We were extremely pleased that the 'Protest' was peaceful (as was the intention). We pray that the outcome will be life changing!

A WALK AROUND WINSHILL

This walk is described by a Winshill resident and is 4 miles long and takes approximately 2 hours to complete. It is often on grass and not on an even surface and may be narrowed by the lush growth of the trees and undergrowth. It is a circular walk and can be joined at any place on the route. There are three pubs en-route for refreshments- but allow more time for this!

- 1. Corner of Hawfield Lane and Sales Lane, near the shops. Turn down Sales Lane and walk past the rear of Bend Oak School Playing Fields to just past the last house in the road on the left.
- 2. Take the footpath which runs through a wooded area at the rear of the houses in Newton Leys until it opens out into a field. Keeping close to the rear gardens of Cherry Leys, find an opening in the hedge which joins the access road to the Mount Pleasant Residential Home.
- 3. Turn left to cross the ford and then turn right into Hollow Lane.
- 4. At the junction with Wheatley Lane, take the footpath opposite just to the right of the last house.
- 5. After about 100 metres take the right fork in the path to follow the Dalebrook. This brook is the boundary between East Staffordshire and South Derbyshire, between Staffordshire and Derbyshire and the East and West Midlands. The Winshill and Stapenhill parts of Burton belonged to Derbyshire until 1878 when they joined Burton and later Staffordshire in 1894.
- 6. The footpath joins Brookside and then turn right into Dalebrook Road and left onto Newton Road.
- 7. Walk along Newton Road to Newton Road Park. On the way you will notice the Mill. A water mill has been on this site for about 1000 years and over the years there has also been cotton, fulling and flint mills and a forge where Lloyds Foundry stared in 1762. Greensmith's Mill ceased milling flour in over 15 years ago and at last it is being renovated and converted into homes. Next to the mill is the Sump, formerly called the Royal Oak.
- 8. Enter the park and turn right towards the Canoe Club hut and left to the riverbank. Walk the whole length of the bank towards the Burton Bridge. The park has National Forest planting which is now well grown. Over the other side of the river is more planting which can be accessed from Meadow Road on the Bridge. (It is possible now to walk along Meadow Road and then by reaching the other arm of the river cross by a new footbridge into Wetmore Community Park and up Wetmore Lane to the new Pirelli Stadium).
- 9. Leave Newton Park via the access road between the houses and cross Ashby Road and Stapenhill Road at the lights at the Swan to walk past the Rowing Clubhouses. Opposite on land next to the garage once stood the Winshill Gibbet.
- 10. Take the path into Stapenhill Garden and then the higher path through the wooded area, before

re-crossing Stapenhill Road opposite the Elms Pub.

11. Walk up Elms Road alongside the Cemetery to the very top. There cross the grassed area to find a path which runs along the Cemetery fence. You will notice at the top of the Cemetery the Forget-Me-knot Garden, a peaceful area. As an alternative, on the right through the gap in the hedge there is a parallel track, which goes past the Tower Woods Play area. The open space was created with National Forest planting in the 1990s.

12. Rejoin the track and walk past the Water Tower and along Tower Road to Ashby Road. There cross over into Queensland Crescent. At the top of the road find a footpath in the right-hand corner (next to no.24). This joins one on the left which drops to Vancouver Drive. Take the steps down opposite into Kimberley Crescent. Turn right then left into Melbourne Crescent and onto the Sales Lane corner where the walk started.

Editorial

Vision

In my first annual report last year I mentioned the Parish Council's vision of a cleaner, safer Winshill whose parks and open spaces were protected and developed for the benefit of the majority. I would like to share with you the three aims that we put forward in the belief that they would enable us achieve that vision. They were: -

- To make Winshill an area of which we can all be proud.
- To make Winshill an area in which all who live there feel they have a stake in their community and feel their opinions are valued.
- To represent the people of Winshill and put their hopes and aspirations at the top of our agenda. I believe that in our second year we are making significant steps towards achieving those aims.

Environment

In January, we appointed a Lengthsman who is already well known in the community and can be easily recognised in his distinctive, high-vision jacket. We receive many complimentary comments about the impact he has on the environment. At this moment we are investigating ways of developing his role.

Communication

Communication between the Parish Council and the public is very high on our agenda. We wish to let the public know what we are doing and we want them to let us know of their needs and aspirations. The first Parish Newsletter was well received and I am delighted with the number of local groups and organisations who contribute to the magazine.

We now have a Parish web site at www.winshill.com. This site is used to advertise and publish the minutes of our meetings. A copy of the Parish Magazine has been pasted on the site. We are now looking to local groups to make their contributions to the site.

We have purchased a Parish Notice Board, which will soon be erected outside the Anglesey Arms. The Parish Council are also using the notice board on Newton Road Recreation Ground.

The ten-minute slot at the beginning of each meeting to allow the public to make their views known has continued and has been used very successfully on occasion.

Joint Working

During the year a new footpath was provided across Winshill Recreation Ground as a result of working together with the Borough and the management committee of the old Community Centre.

One of our roles has been to consider planning applications relevant to the Parish and to make our views known to the planning authority where appropriate.

Another has been to influence the Borough Council in its decision making, an example being the plan for concessionary travel that is now an improvement on the original proposals.

Assisting local organisations

A sum of money has also been made available to make grants to local organisations which operate predominantly for the benefit of residents of the Parish of Winshill and are non-profit making. I am pleased to announce that the first grant has been made to 22nd Burton (St Mark's) Scout Group to help towards the renovation of their building in Church Hill Street.

Parish Plan

The Parish Council have a vision for Winshill that, with the help of you the public, we can achieve. We intend to produce a forward plan for Winshill in the Autumn. If you have any ideas about what you would like to see included in the plan please tell us before the September meeting where it will be discussed.
